





HSIE

The last few weeks of HSIE classes have been dominated by amazing assessment tasks and engaging student activities!

Year 7 are continuing their landscapes and landforms unit and have handed in some wonderful models about a landscape or landform of their interest, accompanied by a geographical report.





Year 8 are moving into their Polynesian Expansion unit. We've unpacked student's prior knowledge (which expands well beyond the Moana movie), origins of Polynesia and the natural features. 8 Quokka have started learning about wayfaring and were challenged to build their own outrigger canoes that needed to float and sail in a straight line. We love



seeing the collaborative creativity that our students use in these class challenges! They also submitted their artefacts from the medieval unit assessment task – which (not surprisingly) look phenomenal.

Year 9 are still engaged in their geographical biomes unit. They've completed their assessments and

are looking at the climate impacts on food production – a unit that's very close to home.

Year 10 recently engaged in a wonderful incursion with a Holocaust survivor. It was amazing to hear from Vera about her family's experience in Nazi Germany via zoom. The students were so engaged and had many interesting questions. They are now moving into their Rights and Freedoms Unit.

Our studious seniors are well in their studies for the year - Year 11 and 12 Ancient students are learning about Ancient Egypt with the wonderful Miss McRae and our Modern students are studying conflict in Europe with the exciting Mr Adcock.

In Aboriginal Studies, the students have submitted some personal identity artefacts which show their deep engagement with their culture and commitment to learning about their family history. We got to see a painted emu egg, some boomerangs, some message sticks and a bark painting. We're so lucky to have such talented students and I couldn't be prouder to be their teacher.

BIG PICTURE OUT LEARNING & SENIOR ADVISORY VISIT

Getting out and about in the local community is a key element of the Big Picture design. Students from Years 9-12 have been busy this term exploring their interests and setting up informational interviews, going out on Shadow days or participating in block placements. Upon returning to school, BP advisors are noticing the shift in student's self-confidence and motivation as they reflect on the engaging conversations they had with mentors in the community. The ability to share their valuable new knowledge at exhibitions and acknowledge how it impacts the way they learn, demonstrates growth and accountability which is the key to success in Big Picture – well done to all.

Sam (12) had a phone interview with Harold who is an experienced pilot and aerial navigator for the RFS water bombers.



Rachael had an informational interview with Ms Rodwell, our relieving HT of Wellbeing about how trauma, experienced during key developmental stages, impacts a person for the rest of their lives.

Bec had an informational interview with Mackie as part of her data collection for her senior thesis project on dementia.





Siam had a week block placement at OPS where she was in a Year 1 classroom and loved interacting with the children and friendly staff.

Siam also did an informational interview with Jesse from Fitness Perfection about working with clients,

motivation techniques and personal fitness training.



Lachie had a week's block placement at 'Smoking Brothers/Elwood's Eatery' where he spent time learning about how the back of house operations and chef duties works together to ensure effective productivity.

Kaeden spent a week interacting with the children at Kiddie Academy and enjoyed reading stories, building

connections with the staff and young children and thrived on the creative and stimulating environment.



Mia did a week block placement at TMH hairdressing and enjoyed the experience of washing and blowdrying hair, greeting clients and loved the overall friendly atmosphere of the salon.







Amelia spent the week working with Amber, a disability support worker and travelled around enjoying the practical interactions with her clients by taking them bowling, going out to lunch, and helping with art therapy. Amelia has now commenced an internship with Amber, engaging in workplace learning two days/week as part of her personalised learning future pathway.



Term One has proven to be a busy period at the Aboriginal Learning and Engagement Centre. We have been providing students with assessment support as the due dates start to come up, we have been seeing our regular Year 8s for the RISYS program, meeting with parents/carers and students to discuss their goals through the Personalised Learning Pathway (PLP) process and touching base with teachers and other stakeholders to discuss how we can best support the students.

This Term the ALEC went on our annual Year 12 excursion. The purpose of this excursion is to experience authentic cultural immersion activities, celebrate the student's achievements of reaching Year 12 and touched base to discuss what they need to do to find success for the rest of the year.

This year we went to the beautiful South Coast near Jervis Bay. Our first stop was an amazing cultural experience with Matt Simms who showed us his country, the different types of bush tucker available and shared his people's stories. Everyone was captivated by this great experience. The next day we challenged ourselves on the Tree Tops Adventure and spent some time at the beach, including a deadly game of volleyball. We ended the trip with the morning at the Jamberoo Adventure park. This was a great trip, enjoyed by both students and staff.







ENGLISH & LOTE

Term 1 is progressing nicely in English, with students engaging well in their learning and working hard for their upcoming assessment tasks.

Year 7 English

Students in Year 7 have continued completing the 'Hertiage and Context of Me' unit with the submission of their first assessment task for English. Students should be very proud of their commitments to this task and the level of engagement in showing their identity and culture.

Year 8 English

Students in Year 8 have continued completing the Mystery Genre unit, gaining a strong knowledge of the conversions and subversions of the genre. Students are interpreting their understanding through the creation of their own visual mystery story.

For the last six weeks, Year 8 Quokka have been deciphering clues to figure out who stole the keys to the storeroom that held the Cluedo boards. This class then had the opportunity to play Cluedo for the mystery unit, photos of this activity are below. This lesson was the culmination of their discovery.



Year 9 English

As Year 9 comes to the end of their 'Sport in Australia' unit, they are conducting their own research into values and cultures of Australia through the interviewing and surveying of members of the school and wider community. They will then present their findings in an extended discursive response completed under exam conditions.

Year 10 English

Students in Year 10 are finalising their novel study and will begin their next unit on Poetry and Social Justice in Week 9. For their Assessment Task, students are engaging with their set novel by completing imaginative pieces based on the world of their text.

Year 11 English

Year 11 English Advanced were treated to a symposium put on by the Theatre Company "Sport for Jove" discussing their recent production of <u>Othello</u>. The students should be commended for their excellent behaviour in representing the school.

On Wednesday the 6th of March, I along with two other students from our school attended a symposium on Shakespeare's play <u>Othello</u>. This symposium was wonderful and helped us gain a higher knowledge and understanding of the themes behind <u>Othello</u>. They took us through the many different acts and scenes, explaining the meaning behind what character's say or do. This was paired with incredible actors that helped convey the emotions and actions perfectly, giving us a real showing of how the characters acted and spoke to one another. This experience helped me gain an advanced understanding of the messages and meaning Shakespeare tried to convey through the play.

Both English Advanced and Standard have their first Senior English Assessment Task due in Week 10 and have been using the writing processes to develop their original pieces.

Year 7 Languages (Chinese)


Year 11 Chinese Beginners have maintained their effort and good

















Year 12 Chinese Beginners


Premier's Reading Challenge








Book Club Recommendation



Term 1 has flown by with students busily investigating in Science. Students are developing their scientific skills through planning and conducting numerous experiments in their Science lessons.


Year 7 have been investigating the properties of matter, exploring the three states and predicting how to separate mixtures.

As an introduction to high school PDHPE, Year 7 students have spent most of this term learning about the 5 dimensions of health. This has included our use of learning sprints to outline each of the dimensions and explain how the 5 dimensions interact. We have also used this knowledge to learn how to construct PEEL paragraphs.

In practical classes, Year 7 have focused on various games and sports that involve cooperation and teamwork. We have also spent some lessons revising athletics throwing events (javelin, shot put and discus) in preparation for the upcoming school athletics carnival.


