PRINCIPAL REPORT

NAIDOC Week

As I am writing this, we are currently celebrating NAIDOC Week here in Orange. NAIDOC Week is a time to celebrate the histories, cultures, and achievements of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people. It is an important annual event where everyone's invited to join in the celebrations. This year, the 2023 theme is "For Our Elders".



Our Aboriginal Education Team, led by Baden Curran, has been planning the NAIDOC Week celebrations and school events over the past few months. We were fortunate enough to have Uncle Neil Ingram, a proud Wiradjuri elder deliver the Welcome to Country at our NAIDOC Week assembly which was held on Tuesday 24/10/23.

Our students were also addressed by Donna Stanley, who recently received the UNSW 2022

Australian Mental Health Prize. Donna has been a tireless advocate for the mental health needs of her people, applying her knowledge of how Aboriginal communities' social structures influence the mental health of individuals.

DEPUTY PRINCIPAL REPORT

Welcome back to Term 4. This is an exciting and busy term with NAIDOC Week, HSC examinations, years 7-11 examinations and reports, and the very welcome return of warmer weather.

NAIDOC Week, which commenced in Week 3, was a wonderful time for our school community. On Monday 23rd, a group of students and staff participated in the NAIDOC March representing our school and community with pride. A number of our students expressed their pride in their culture by performing in the Aboriginal dance troupe and Jayanna Dixon from year 9 was named as a Junior Sports Person of the Year.

On Tuesday 24th, the school acknowledged and celebrated this year's NAIDOC theme, For Our Elders. During the day, we were supported to understand the importance of our Aboriginal Elders and the knowledge and history they hold of our nation. As a school, we were privileged to have a number of Elders and special guests join us for an assembly, lunch, and afternoon activities. This was a wonderful afternoon, and we are very grateful for our guests and the way our school celebrated as a community.

As part of Orange's NAIDOC Week, we also had students participate in NAIROC as part of the school's Aboriginal dance group and Wiradjuri choir. It is with great pride that I can report the dance group achieved first place for their performance for the fourth year running. I would like to take this opportunity to thank Chris Jones and our NASCA academy for supporting this group so closely.

Term 4 is a very big time in the lives of our Year 12 students. After 13 years of school, our 2023 cohort is sitting their final school examinations in the form of the HSC, which finishes on November 3rd. It is always a time of great joy and sadness for staff as they congratulate but say goodbye to the little kids they have watched grow into young adults.

Our 7-9 cohort will sit their end of year examinations this term, commencing in Week 5. Students should be encouraged to talk to their classroom teachers about how to study and what areas to focus on. The end of year examinations will contribute to each student's results in their End of Year report.

As we move towards the end of the year, I would like to encourage students to strive for a high level of attendance. To give themselves the best chance of achieving their personal best, students should aim to maintain an attendance rate of 90%. This equates to missing only 5 days for the term. Please use the parent portal to explain any absences. You can also call or send your child with a note. This will enable us to record days of absences as explained.

Finally, as the weather starts to warm up, it is important to remember the school's uniform requirements. Please don't hesitate to contact the school if your child requires support with uniform.

ENGLISH & LOTE

Year 11/12

Year 11/12 have begun their HSC courses this term. For English Advanced, Standard and Studies they are completing the Common Module: Texts and Human Experience. English Advanced is exploring the module through the play The Crucible, English Standard through the poetry of Kenneth Slessor, and English Studies through the film Billy Elliot.

Year 10

Year 10 have successfully completed their formal assessments for the year and are to be commended for their mature approach to their Yearly Examinations. This unit is designed to assist students in consolidating and refining their English skills, setting them up for success in Stage 6 English. Year 7 Chinese

They will further extend their cultural knowledge and understanding by learning about Chinese dining etiquette, brewing and tasting tea (a Chinese leisure drink), and attempting a chopstick challenge. There are a lot of opportunities for interaction and hands-on learning in class. Keep having fun!





Year 11 Chinese Beginners

Year 11 Chinese Beginners continue building their knowledge, understanding and skills by reflecting on their results in the yearly exam. They are learning to communicate about time and daily routines through various sentence structures. Students have extended their cultural knowledge and understanding by attempting popular Chinese board games (e.g., Chinese checkers) and tasting Chinese festive foods (e.g., mooncakes). Students will learn to discuss their home environment, dwelling, rooms and furniture. They will also learn to talk about clothing, including colours and types of clothes. With this new language, students can describe how the clothes fit and that they are looking for something particular. Students will also try on some traditional Chinese clothes.




