PRINCIPAL REPORT

Welcome to Week 6,

First and foremost, I would like to announce and congratulate our school and vice captains who were elected to lead our school in 2024.

2024 School Captains- Rebecca Rhodes and Franky Tan 2024 Vice-Captains- Samuel Gross and Jarrod LoFaro.



This year, we had 8 students apply for these positions. It is great to work in a school environment where our students are dedicated and passionate about undertaking leadership roles to positively advocate for the school. We will also soon announce a School Prefect Team who will work alongside our Captains and SRC to lead and drive whole school initiatives.

As the year is gradually coming to an end, we can reflect upon what has been an extremely positive year for our staff and students at CRTHS. Our students across Years 7-10 have recently finished their End of Year examinations, Year 11 are navigating the first term of their selected HSC courses, and our Year 12 cohort is patiently waiting to receive their HSC results when they are released on the 14 December 2023.

We have seen an increase in student engagement in learning throughout the year, which has been further reinforced by the recent mobile phone ban which commenced at the start of Term 4 2023. I would like to thank our parents/carers and students for their support of this policy. Our students have been extremely compliant thus far and anecdotally, our teachers have reported a significant improvement in classroom engagement and the completion of high-quality work from our students.

After completing our External Validation process in June 2023, we are currently planning for our new Strategic Improvement Plan (2024 – 2027) which is due for completion by the end of Term 1, 2024. The School Excellence Framework domains of Student Performance Measures, Effective Classroom Practice, and Educational Leadership will underpin this planning process and inform our new plan.

Currently, we are developing our new Improvement Measures which have been recently announced by the NSWDoE. Contextually developed school-based targets focused on Attendance, Reading, Numeracy, and Year 12 Pathways are being established.



We are also working through the Executive Summary of the School Climate Survey which was undertaken in Term 2. This National School Improvement Partnerships' (NSI) School Climate Suite was developed through extensive research undertaken at Curtin University and provides an effective, reliable, and valid means of collecting perception data from important stakeholders within our school community.

For our survey, we had 52 teachers, 16 staff, 366 students, and 49 parents/caregivers provide feedback about our school context. The comprehensive executive summary is now being used to critically reflect on our current school environment and is helping us guide, promote, and monitor our whole school improvement efforts.

The School Climate Survey provides data around the four key pillars which include the Institutional Environment, Safety, Community, and Academic pillars. From this data, the school has prioritised working in the Academic domain to ensure our students are equipped with the relevant literacy and numeracy skills to engage in their curriculum content and be successful in their learning.

We have recently held successful transition days for our incoming Year 7 students. I would like to thank Cara Horsley, Amy Bonney, Yvette Rodwell, Ross Sutherland, Minh Doan, and Enzo Silvestro for their successful implementation of our Year 6/7 Transition Day which was held on Tuesday 7th, and Wednesday 8th November.

Both days ran smoothly, and I have already received a lot of positive feedback from our incoming students and primary school staff. I would also like to thank all our teachers who conducted the Taster Lessons to provide our incoming students with some new classroom experiences to better prepare them for next year.

We currently have 148 students coming into Year 7 in 2024, which is a huge increase on the 108 Year 7 students who came through in the 2023 cohort. This is a testament to the quality work of our teaching and non-teaching staff here at CRTHS as we continue to strive for whole-school improvement and provide suitable academic and well-being support for all students.

Year 11 students have assessments due in the coming weeks and are encouraged to submit drafts to their teachers prior to final submission to ensure they achieve their best.






BIG PICTURE




ENGLISH & LOTE


Year 11 Chinese Beginners have learned to communicate about time and daily routines through various sentence structures. They have extended their cultural knowledge and
