YEAR 8 OUTLEARNING

Year 8 Big Picture Students enjoyed a day in the sunshine at Gosling Creek in Week 2, engaging in a range of field work activities to collate a range of information to support the development of a Field Study Report on the importance and benefits of sustainable management practices in the Gosling Creek Reserve.

Students reflected on the experience, appreciating how valuable it is to learn by engaging in activities beyond the classroom rather than sitting at desks. These “Outlearning” experiences are heavily encouraged through the Big Picture learning design, and many of the Year 9 and 10 students are currently exploring opportunities to engage in real-world work with experts in the community to support their interest, exploration and the development of skills that will support them in future employment.



HSIE

HSIE has continued to explore the world and the history of its people in Term 2.

Year 10 Elective History students went for a historical walking excursion today. We visited the Orange Regional Museum, Holy Trinity Anglican Church and the Returned and Services League Memorial Hall and explored their historical collections. We then went to various historical sites, including past the old Orange gaol, Cook and Robertson Parks and their war memorials. It was great to see students making connections between these locations and how they record Orange's involvement in global events such as the world wars.

Students were able to make clear connections to their family history from what they saw.

GROW FRUIT & VEGGIES FOR FOODCARE COMMUNITY PROJECT



Can you help?

FoodCare is a local Orange charity that provides free and low-cost food and groceries to members of the community who are on low incomes or may be homeless or disadvantaged. FoodCare is run and operated by more than 60 local volunteers. FoodCare receives no recurrent government funding.

We believe it's very important for families to have access to free or affordable fruit and veggies. We 'rescue' food that is nearing its best before or use-by date from supermarkets to redistribute for free to FoodCare customers, but like most good businesses they are focusing on waste reduction, resulting in less food for us to collect.
