PRINCIPAL REPORT

Greetings,

During Term 2, our school engaged in a School Climate Survey which saw our parents/carers, teachers and students undertake a survey that focused upon four key themes. These themes are referred to as the four pillars which work in unison together to promote school improvement. The pillars are the Institutional Environment, Safety, Community, and Academics.

Last week, I met with Dean White (Executive Director- Rural South and West), Duncan Auld (Director Educational Leadership- Orange Network), and Susan Hilliar (Director of Educational Leadership- School Upgrades) to unpack our School Climate Executive Summary. Whilst there is still a lot of data to review from this survey, there is clear and significant evidence that supports a significant upgrade for our school which will provide our students with a high-quality learning environment.

Later this term, a team from the Assets Management Unit will come out to CRTHS to undertake a site inspection. This will help identify the areas of improvement which are required for our school site. I am also scheduled to meet with Murat Dizdar (Secretary of the NSW Department of Education) early in Term 4 to discuss this matter further.

Whilst the AMU is responsible for the infrastructure, our school is responsible for acting upon the data associated with Safety, Community, and Academics. Whilst this data has validated the positive work we have been doing within our school context over the past few years, we have also identified areas for improvement which will be used in our new school planning cycle which will be developed during Term 4, 2023 for a 2024 implementation.

I am looking forward to sharing more of this information with you all over the coming weeks/months.

In our last newsletter, I shared with you information about the pending Mobile Phone Ban and the school-based management system that we will be using here at CRTHS. Over the past few weeks, we have developed a school-based policy to support this mandated government ban. This policy document will be emailed to all parents/carers with this newsletter edition.

From a community perspective, we have developed this policy in consultation with Molong Central School and Orange High School to ensure there is a consistent approach within the Orange Network. All three schools have selected the Mobile Phone Locker pouches and we will have the same implementation strategies and consequences for students who fail to comply with this policy. Information will continue to be distributed over the coming weeks to ensure our community is aware of the implementation process.

As we move further into Term 3, I would like to wish our Year 12 students all the best as they complete their last 4-weeks of secondary schooling. Whilst there are exciting times ahead, these students must remain focused on their studies and continue to strive for improvement.

For Year 11, I wish you all the best in your upcoming Final Examinations. This will be a new challenge for you all but one I am sure you are all well prepared for.

I would also like to pass on my congratulations to those students who have applied to be our 2024 School Captains. These students will have the opportunity to present their speeches during the Week 8 assembly which will be held on Thursday 7th September. We have some excellent candidates and I look forward to announcing the newly elected school and vice captains who will be inducted at the Year 12 Farewell Assembly which will be held on Thursday 21st September.



Year 7 Chinese


Year 11 Chinese Beginners

Under Agent Lori's breath she said, "I hope I never come back to this underground lair, It's too dark and gloomy for my likings".


I have never been on this type of mission before. A secret organization has to be a secret and so does my job. I will have to go back to the crime scene, but at night this time not throughout the day.

Night comes around and Agent Lori gets ready to go to the crime scene.


